Step Up For Ostomy - A National Awareness Campaign

Step Up For Ostomy is an annual awareness and fundraising event in support of the Ostomy Canada Society and its mission. On September 23, 2023, people living with an ostomy across Canada participated in a national Ostomy Awareness Day. This campaign will support our outreach, education, advocacy, and program development for the estimated 135,000 affected by an ostomy in Canada.

The Step Up For Ostomy campaign started with our Summer Kickoff Contest. Our only winner of a \$100 Amazon gift card is Linz Kemble (right). She is a young adult living with an ileostomy and is a member of Calgary Ostomy. She was diagnosed with a rare disease called (Sessile) Serrated Polyposis Syndrome. This caused innumerable polyps in her large bowel, some being pre-cancerous, so surgeons removed her entire colon. With so many Canadians needing to reconnect with local support, these groups made enormous steps in community outreach. A big shout out to:

Vancouver United Ostomy Association held its annual awareness walk at LaFarge Lake. They raised \$230 in a collection jar for Ostomy Canada.

Calgary Ostomy Society raised \$3,355.00. About 60 people participated in their awareness walk, seated yoga session, Ostomy Expo, and BBQ. They also held an Ostomy Photoshoot with Sean Currie, so look

Regina & District Ostomy Association held a successful awareness walk and yoga session, with over 45 donors and \$6200 raised.

It was a chaotic first year for everyone on our board. We were learning how to move to an online meeting platform, the reality of losing several longstanding members to the virus and declining membership. We felt we were struggling to stay afloat.

ostomy tips for CELEBRATING THE HOLIDAYS

It's that time of year again! Whether it's a birthday, Easter, Ramadan, Thanksgiving, Christmas — the holidays are here, and it's time to celebrate! For those living with an ostomy, the anxiety of being around people can add some extra stress. Don't worry! With a few simple tips, you'll be ready to confidently and joyfully ring in the festivities.

1. Stifle A Noisy Stoma

Be mindful to relax your abdominal muscles so gas can easily pass through the stoma. If you feel the rumble of gas, try pressing your hand or forearm against your stoma. Hint: wear a jacket with pockets to discretely do this. Ambient noise will make most stoma noises inaudible.

Dressing to muffle your stoma can also help. This can include highwaisted pants, layers, sweaters, or undergarments like shape wear. One item you can find easily in the maternity section is a belly wrap or band. There are also some specialized ostomy products designed to muffle noise, including:

- Stoma Stiffler
- Stealth Belt with optional Muffler added.
- Stoma guards like Stomaplex

2. Be Mindful About Food

Another consideration is not arriving to dinner on an empty stomach. Missing meals can create more gas, so eat a small breakfast and snacks until dinner is ready. Increased output is also not ideal, so consider eating a small portion and bringing some home for later.

Certain foods can cause more gas. This includes beans, beer, broccoli, brussel sprouts, cabbage, corn, cucumbers, cauliflower, mushrooms, peas, radishes, spinach, dairy products, and excess sugar.

Foods that can slow output can also be helpful, like Applesauce, bananas, cheese, boiled milk, marshmallows, pasta, smooth peanut butter, pretzels, rice, bread, tapioca, yogurt, bagels, and oatmeal.

3. What About Alcohol?

You may find that gastrointestinal upsets associated with alcohol that used to occur before surgery are gone with removing the diseased bowel. However, those with ileostomies are at greater risk of dehydration and electrolyte loss, and you should have water, juice, or pop with your drink. You can also buy packets of Hydralyte to carry in your pocket or purse. Beer and carbonated drinks can produce gas. Alcohol may give you loose output or extra output or not affect stool. Everybody's different.

4. Minimize Odours

Ostomy deodorizer - don't leave home without it! All the major companies offer bottles of liquid ostomy deodorant, even in travel sizes. If you are in a pinch, drug stores often sell products like

VIP Poo spray or Just a Drop which can also help to mask the odour. Just A Drop also makes the perfect purse-sized spray.

Some foods, such as asparagus, broccoli, brussel sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower, beans, eggs, fish, onions and some spices, will increase odour.

5. Always Be Prepared

Extra ostomy supplies are always a good idea, especially when travelling. You can leave them in the car, which is not recommended for extreme heat or cold. You can create a small kit in your purse or a backpack. Be sure to pre-cut the flange and use individual wipes or travel sizes to keep it compact. There is a no-rinse wipe by Safe N' Simple: Peri-Skin Cleaner & Adhesive Remover. If you must change while away from home, some companies sell odour-proof disposal bags, like Attiva Ostomy Essentials' Sean-N-Toss Ostomy Disposal System. 6. Leave No Trace

Here are a few last tips for managing your ostomy during the holidays. Avoid backsplash when you empty by lining the toilet with toilet paper. If there is still stool after flushing, use a wad of toilet paper to wipe the bowl and flush again. You can also try a biodegradable pouch liner such as Colomajic. Wet Ones offers individually wrapped Antibacterial Wet Wipes, if you want to keep it clean for the next person. **O**



ostomy tips for EMBARRASSING SITUATIONS

DID THAT REALLY JUST HAPPEN? The closure at the bottom of my ostomy bag just opened while I was standing in my friend's living room! I need to get to the bathroom STAT! There is a mess on her living room floor and I am soooooo EMBARRASSED!

Those of us who have had an ostomy for many years certainly can relate to similar situations cropping up unexpectedly more than once. They are truly mortifying when they occur. However, if we are able to understand that these situations happen from time to time; and are potentially unavoidable, it makes it easier to accept, calmly deal with, and get on with life.

I had to think of a way that I can emotionally handle it when these embarrassing moments 'pop' up. Then it came to me; my ostomy is my baby!

An infant who may do anything, anytime, anywhere. It is generally understood that the infant does not know any better nor have any type of control. Well, my ostomy; who I call Ileana (since she is an ileostomy), does not know any better nor has any type of control. Now, I knew I had to stop getting upset when things did not go as I had planned. I tell myself, that everything is all right. In my lengthy experience I have learned that I just need to clean myself up first and then take care of any other messes. It's OKAY!

So, I am fine when I am alone when these surprises happen. How about when I am with a group of people who are purely acquaintances and are not aware of the fact that I have an ostomy? This is more difficult. First, I have to accept the fact that it is perfectly acceptable to have an ostomy. I am just as attractive and productive with or without the ostomy. I am a beautiful and caring woman who gives back to her community every day. The ostomy is strictly a way to get rid of wastes and does not define me. I can allow myself to be human and as such realize that everyone has unexpected events and may experience an embarrassing moment - of any kind. If they can deal with the situation and then go about their business, so can I. Nothing will hold me back from living life to the fullest. The facts of life are that everyone must eat, sleep, eliminate and pay their bills in order to survive. The phone, electric and water companies do not care how they get paid so long as it arrives on time. Well, the same goes for us. It is of no consequence whether we eliminate through the back or the front. Just do it!

I came to accept this so it is no big deal and then if I have an incident I say something like, "Ooops, my ostomy bag just popped! Can someone please get me

a towel and help me to the bathroom?" Many times there are questions afterwards; but I do not mind because it presents the opportunity for me to educate others which leads to a better understanding and the creation of positive stories.

"People fear what they don't understand & that leads to stigma."

Thus; the stigma and fear are reduced when I set a positive example. I found most people to be very understanding, empathetic to the situation and gain an appreciation by furthering their knowledge. I also believe this leads to their being kinder and more compassionate should they again meet someone experiencing a similar situation in the future and be able to assist them.

Here is a tip that helps me. I have two closures for my drainable bags. One is the closure that comes with the bag; the second is a barrette placed about an inch above the given closure. This helps reduce the amount of leakages from the bottom of the bag. Also; networking is great because I can share ideas with others like me. Social media groups and attending conferences are two possibilities and I strongly recommend both of them. The more people you meet in a similar situation the better. Maybe someone has a solution you did not think of or perhaps you have an idea that will help them. You are never alone.

So, go out, be confident, and wear two closures and the next time you have an embarrassing moment remember to tell yourself everything will be alright!

Humor is always good too - POOP HAPPENS!! O

Our audience are invitees from the provincial government, NSWOC Nurses, and associates from hospitals. Our ask is "ACCESS TO MORE CARE" for persons living with ostomies in Alberta.

My place on the agenda is to tell of my journey living with an ostomy. The lack of care from a NSWOC Nurse not available in a close by location, the distance necessary to travel to receive care when one lives in a rural area, the high costs of devices necessary



for a person with an ostomy, and the fear that this journey is not only one of physical issues but that of medical issues as well. Recognizing over the years that we need to advocate for access to more care, has given me the purpose to be involved with Ostomy Canada and to partner with NSWOCC.

Ostomy surgery is indeed a journey, one that is a life change and most often takes from one to two years both physically and mentally. There are many who experience mental health challenges such as social isolation, sexual dysfunction, hopelessness, suicidal thoughts, quality of life, and depression. All of which, the patient requires access to care.

Many thanks to NSWOCC for giving Ostomy Canada and myself the opportunity to inform the invitees what an ostomy life is like and what we require. **O**

Edmonton Ostomy Peer Support Group now has five qualified Ostomy Canada Society Visitors who completed the training in a group setting in September. The training was completed within 4 hours at a local library, positive feedback on the online training was received, and the setting was a great way to share, reflect, respect and embrace each person's experience of living with an ostomy. We continue to grow and get stronger. Anne Le, the Edmonton group facilitator practising NSWOC, and Mary Hill, Alberta Health Services Homecare, did an excellent presentation together at the Alberta Summit.

Regina has expanded its outreach to include all parts of the province this fall. 

Maple Leaf Award

Ruth Kenney

NSWOC from Nova Scotia

- For 50 or more years, Ruth has been helping people living with an Ostomy and their families in Canada
- Helped to establish the national visitor training program
- Founder of Ostomy Halifax Society in 1973
- Ruth remains the conscience and soul of Ostomy Halifax
- Supported and helped start chapters and satellite groups in the Atlantic region
- Original (OG) ostomy nurse in Nova Scotia
- Recent former director of Friends of Ostomates Worldwide (Canada)

Ruth helped to establish the national visitor training program. She is a founder of our organization, has supported and helped start chapters and satellite groups in our province

and within the Atlantic region and was the original (OG) ostomy nurse in Nova Scotia. The preceding list is amongst nearly countless contributions to the local and national ostomy community. She is also a recent former director of Friends of Ostomates Worldwide (Canada). She has collected and sent ostomy supplies to FOWC's office for many years so those without ready access to supplies would have some.

Before there was a visitor training program Ruth would help ostomates in the hospital as an ET nurse and on her own time outside of work hours. As mentioned she helped start the national visitor training program.

It is quite possible that in the 50 or more years that Ruth has been helping ostomates and their families in Canada that she has contributed to each and every of the boxes that could be checked above. I am sure she has contributed in every way possible to Ostomy



Halifax, including before it was named that. She helped found its predecessor organization in 1973 and was its second president from 1977-78. As mentioned above, she helped develop the first national visitor training program and was, for a time, a board member of the national organization. Until very recently Ruth was a board member of FOWC and has collected ostomy supplies locally for many years so that they could be distributed to those supplies around the world to those that could most use them.

Ruth was an RN who had ostomy surgery in 1969 after being diagnosed with ulcerative colitis. She planned

the first Maritime Regional Ostomy Conference in 1978, attracting 200 participants from Quebec and the four Atlantic Provinces. In 1979 Ruth paid her own way to attend an intense six week training program in enterostomal therapy education at Tucson Medical Center because she wanted to help current and future patients who had undergone ostomy surgery. At the time she was the only nurse in Nova Scotia with such training. In 1984, with the support of Ostomy Halifax,

Ruth led the charge to have the province fund the first full-time Enterostomal Therapist nurse (ET) at the VG Hospital in Halifax. This work paved the way for more ET hires in Nova Scotia hospitals in the years after that. In 1993, Ruth became the first recipient of the United Ostomy Association Enterostomal Therapist of the Year Award. At the time of the award there were over 200 chapters of the association in Canada and the United States. That year, Ruth received the City of Dartmouth Volunteer of the Year award. In 2002, she was named Canadian Enterostomal Therapist of the Year. In all of the years between then and now Ruth remained active in the chapter as an active member of the business team, arranging program speakers, liaising with the NSWOC community, supporting FOWC, advocating for ostomates, participating in fundraisers, and helping anyone who would ask selflessly - you name it and

she has probably done it for the betterment of our community.

It would be hard to imagine anyone more deserving of Ostomy Canada's highest award than Ruth Kenney. Ruth has been contributing to Ostomy Canada's vision of helping those who have undergone ostomy surgery live life to the fullest since she became an ostomate herself in 1969. Not four years after having her own ostomy surgery, the result of ulcerative colitis, Ruth co-founded the organization that would eventually become Ostomy Halifax Society (1973). Adapted from the Ostomy Halifax Society website, here is a capsule of Ruth's impressive resume:

1973 – Ruth started the first of a series of annual lectures at the VG Hospital in Halifax for second year nursing students on their role in rehabilitating ostomates.

1977/78 – Second President, Ostomy Halifax.

1978 – A planner of the first Maritime Regional Ostomy Conference which attracted 200 participants from Quebec and the four Atlantic Provinces. Ruth becomes the resource person for effective pre and post-op management of ostomates at the VG Hospital.

1979 – Completed ET training in Tuscon Arizona.

1982 – Planned and participated in an ostomy workshop at the Middleton Hospital for nurses and ostomates in the Annopolis Valley area.

1984 – The first Enterostomal Therapy program was started at the VG Hospital thanks to the lobbying efforts of Ostomy Halifax, and two ET nurses including Ruth Kenney.

1986 – Ruth's article on "Conventional Versus Continent Ileostomy" was published in World Council of Enterostomal Therapy.

1993 – Ruth became the very first recipient of the United Ostomy Association Enterostomal Therapist of the Year Award. At this time there were over 200 chapters of the association worldwide.

2002 – Ostomy Canada presented Ruth with the ET of the year award.

Additionally, in 1993 Ruth received the City of Dartmouth Volunteer of the Year Award. It is truly

difficult to believe she could have found the time to do more for her community but that is Ruth. In the early days of Ostomy Halifax Ruth was known to travel with a companion or two through Nova Scotia and Atlantic Canada helping to start chapters and satellite organizations. Back in Halifax, she understood well the importance of "support" and would encourage new ostomates to attend meetings, sometimes providing drives to and from the meeting venue. People would come to meetings to ask Ruth questions, which she always happily answered. She often went well beyond the call of duty.

Ruth is a recent past director of the board of the FOWC. A huge supporter of the organization, Ruth has gathered and packaged ostomy supplies for them for years so those supplies could be re-distributed to ostomates the world over.

In 2013 Ostomy Halifax Society acknowledged Ruth's enormous contributions with its highest honour, the Burleigh Wile Award. Now in her 80s, Ruth remains the conscience and soul of Ostomy Halifax and a fervent advocate and supporter of all people who have ostomates and their support networks. If you were to attend Ostomy Halifax's monthly business team meeting's, Ruth would be there contributing meaningfully to the conversation just as she has for 50 years. She remains a fixture at our monthly member meetings and continues to chair our programming committee.
